SWEETIE'S STORY

It was a wet day in the woods early this spring, and Sweetie the Rottweiler was with her family, on the alert for anything that might harm them.

But the harm, when it came, was to her, not them. Jack was taking down a tree, not even a very large one. Something went wrong, and although the tree trunk missed Sweetie, a small branch hit her—hard—across the back.

She went down, and she couldn't get up! For the first time in her nearly 10 years with the Lehsten family, her powerful haunches wouldn't bring her to her feet. She struggled to pull herself up, and couldn't.

Jack and Marianne ran to her, terrified that she was dying. They had loved Sweetie, their constant companion for the five years since she'd come to them from their daughter, whose own daughter's life Sweetie once saved from drowning.

Sweetie weighs about 110 pounds, but they got her home, somehow, and then to the nearest veterinary clinic. They had very little money, but never even thought of that.



After an exam, they heard the verdict-nothing could be done for Sweetie at a price they could pay. Surgery from a specialist was a possibility, but was not likely to do any good, would be very painful and would cost thousands of dollars. Sadly, Jack and Marianne took Sweetie home.

Back in their small trailer in the woods, they nursed her as best they could, one of them always with her. They carried her outside each day to relieve herself, and cried a lot into her fur at night.

Who knows how Sweetie's story and her life-might have ended? But a friend of theirs, who also loved Sweetie, heard about Peninsula Friends of Animals and called us.

TIDINGS Q & A

Q: Some of my friends refuse to buy Yoplait Yogurt because the container is said to be dangerous to pets. What exactly is the danger?

A: The problem is the rim on the popular 6oz. containers. Once the empty containers get into the environment, small animals can get their heads caught in them. Yoplait admits their containers have caused harm to skunks, but won't fess up to the possibility that they have caused aggravation or death to kittens, puppies, squirrels and other small animals.

Perhaps the most troubling issue is that Yoplait has known about this problem for a number of years but has refused to do anything significant about it. The company points to a tiny statement printed on each container that recommends crushing before disposal. How many people have seen this statement? How many are likely to follow it? How easy is it to actually crush these containers unless done with a heavy shoe?

Some consumers have noted that there is absolutely no good reason for Yoplait to continue to design the containers with this type of rim, with or without danger to animals, and choose not to purchase Yoplait products until such time as that rim is redesigned.

They will tell you they are working on resolving the problem. They've been saying this for years.

"It can't be done."

That's all you have to say to my friend, Heidi, and she'll find a way to do it—especially when it comes to animals.

Four motherless kittens had been living outside our hospital. They were sustained by handouts from staff but remained untouchable. Administration wanted them out, so local Animal Control was called. We were told they would be "fixed" and adopted out.

When three had been caught, Heidi went to visit. She was told they had been "put down" because feral kittens couldn't be domesticated and weren't adoptable. She left the place in a rage, determined not to let the same fate befall the fourth kitten. She decided to trap that last one herself. Once caught, he was taken directly to her own vet where he was given a clean bill of health.

Heidi's household was already "animal full", so her parents agreed to provide a *temporary* foster home—they had declared they were done owning pets. Or so they thought!

Corky had won them over. Although shy around strangers, he became a wonderful house cat, socializing with the folks and sleeping on the bed with them each and every night.

And what was said "couldn't be done" was done...with love and with patience.

Best Bet to Reduce Stray Cat Numbers: T-N-R

PFOA's ongoing Trap-Neuter-Return (T-N-R) program has made a dramatic dent in the overpopulation of stray and feral (wild) cats in our community.

T-N-R begins with volunteers who trap humanely a stray, abandoned or feral cat. The animal is then taken to a local veterinarian where she or he is spayed or neutered as necessary and treated for any parasites or injuries.

The next step is to return the animal to a willing caretaker (usually at the same location where trapped) who has volunteered to feed and care for the cat.

As of May 31, 2002, PFOA's T-N-R program had successfully trapped and spayed or neutered over 120 feral or stray cats.

Given that one unsterilized female cat can theoretically be responsible (along with her offspring) for over 400,000 kittens born over the course of her reproductive years, thousands of cats have *not* been born in the area over the past two years as a direct result of PFOA's T-N-R program.







PFOA volunteers Nancy Campbell and Kelly Thomas loaded up the car with food and a sling to help lift Sweetie, and headed east the next day. When they arrived, they found Jack and Marianne and Sweetie, plus nearly a dozen stray cats whom they had also somehow found a way to feed.

Sweetie, true to her guarding nature, wanted to drive off these intruders, but Kelly knows dogs and sat down beside her on the floor. When she finally put a hand out, Sweetie clamped her teeth on her arm, but Kelly kept talking and Sweetie gradually relaxed.

Jack and Marianne had wished for a cart that is used for paralyzed dogs and cats, so that Sweetie could be independent again. PFOA made arrangements to get one, and also put the Lehstens in touch with the Jefferson County Humane Society Auxiliary who have a T-N-R program similar to PFOA's. The cats are now in the process of being trapped, spayed or neutered, and returned to Jack and Marianne, who will continue to feed and watch over them.

It took awhile to get Sweetie's measurements, get the cart ordered, and then have a skilled veterinarian do the final adjustments on it. But on a recent lovely June day, Sweetie became the owner of new "legs"—her very own cart from



Doggone Wheels. Her head was up, and Kelly and Nancy swear there was a smile on her face as she took her first unaided steps in a long, long time.

The last they saw of her as they headed back to Safe Haven was that good old dog proudly leading Jack and Marianne down the trail to the woods. ——AG

Safe Haven Update

PFOA continues to work with Clallam County at the process of gaining the right to begin remodeling construction at the existing building at the Safe Haven sanctuary site.

Progress has been slow but steady and positive. We believe it is only a matter of days or a few short weeks before every requirement set forth by the county has been satisfied and work can begin. The hope is that once remodeling construction has begun, it will be only about 90 days before animals currently residing in scattered foster homes can be brought together in one location under the Safe Haven roof.

It is going to take more money than we currently have in our Building Fund to make all of this happen. Among other things there will have to be a sprinkler system, handicapped access, a firewall between the caretaker's quarters and the rest of the house, completion of the basement, and outdoor cat fencing.

HOW TO GIVE A CAT A PILL

If you've ever tried to give a cat a pill, you know how difficult it is. The following instructions are absolutely fool proof.....maybe!

- 1. Pick up the cat and cradle it in the crook of your left arm, as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth, pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.
- 2. Retrieve pill from floor and cat from under chair. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.
- 3. Retrieve cat from bedroom and throw soggy pill away.
- 4. Take a new pill from foil wrap. Cradle cat in left arm holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.
- 5. Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse in from garden.
- 6. Kneel on floor with cat wedged firmly between the knees. Holding front and rear paws, ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold cat's head firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler and rub cat's throat vigorously.
- 7. Retrieve cat from curtain rail, get another pill from foil wrap. Make a note to buy a new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered figurines from hearth and set aside for gluing later.
- 8. Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with its head just visible from beneath spouse's armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force cat's mouth open with pencil and blow down straw.
- 9. Check label to make sure that pill is not harmful to humans. Drink glass of water to take taste away. Apply Band-Aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.
- 10. Retrieve cat from neighbor's shed. Get another pill. Place cat in cupboard and close door onto neck to leave head showing. Force mouth open with spoon, flick pill down throat with elastic band.
- 11. Fetch screwdriver from garage and put door back on hinges. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for last tetanus shot. Throw T-shirt away and fetch new one from bedroom.
- 12. Call the fire department to retrieve cat from tree across the road. Apologize to neighbor who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil wrap.
- 13. Tie cat's front paws to rear paws with garden twine and bind tightly to leg of dining room table. Find heavy duty pruning gloves from garage. Force cat's mouth open with small trowel. Push pill into mouth followed by a large piece of fillet steak. Hold head vertically and pour ½ pint of water down throat to wash pill down.
- 14. Get spouse to drive you to emergency room. Sit quietly while doctor stitches finger and forearm and removes pill remnants from right eye. Stop by furniture store on the way home to order a new table.
