There are four large rooms downstairs with 6-15 cats each in them. There are two kitten rooms upstairs, soon to house at least one litter apiece. Boxes need scooping. Floors need sweeping, vacuuming and mopping. Food dishes need filling and water needs changing. Laundry sometimes needs doing. Medication sometimes needs giving. And cats need grooming and socializing.

That's not *all* that needs doing at Safe Haven. There is a critical need for *office* help. Typists, filers, organizers, cleaners, greeters, telephone message takers......hopefully all of the above!

If you're a PFOA member and have been staying in the background until such time as cats are living at Safe Haven, the time to step forward is now. We especially need people who are willing to do a variety of tasks around the building over a regular 2, 3 or even 6 hour span, once or twice a week....all of which can be interspersed with frequent visits into the cat quarters to play with and love the residents.

BIG SAFE HAVEN GRAND OPENING OVER; CATS IN PLACE AND READY FOR ADOPTION

It was two years in the making, but Safe Haven finally came to fruition on the weekend of Feb. 28 & 29. Several hundred donors and supporters came by to see the culmination of thousands of hours of volunteer and professional work that prepared the building to house temporarily 65 to "homeless" felines at a time, all of whom are in need of permanent homes in the local community.

Now that the Grand Opening is behind us and the cats and kittens are securely nestled in their new apartments at Safe Haven, the work of finding permanent homes for all these wonderful pets kicks into high gear.

Safe Haven's residents come from a huge variety of b a c k g r o u n d s a n d circumstances. Some were


left behind when their guardians died or moved into assisted living facilities. Others were found living on the streets with no apparent human help. One sweet little de-clawed girl was discovered in a parking lot dumpster. Still others came from abusive situations too heartbreaking to recount in detail. Suffice it to say the terror they may have faced in the past is a distant—but often still painful—memory.

In the four years leading up to Safe Haven's Grand Opening, PFOA has adopted pets out of a network of foster homes spread between Diamond Point and west Port Angeles. It wasn't always convenient for potential adopters to visit all of the animals in which they had an interest. Safe Haven, though, represents opportunity to house PFOA's most adoptable pets in a single, central location halfway between the two largest communities in our

county. It makes it possible for potential adopters to select their new companions from a sizeable group of healthy, friendly, well-socialized, and entertaining felines all living in one convenient location and all ready for their own permanent, loving homes.

eBay Auctions to Replace Yearly Garage Sales

PFOA has made a decision to do away with it's yearly garage sales and replace their fund raising potential with sales of donated items on Internet auction giant eBay.

The garage sales were always fun and successful, but the amount of work was often overwhelming. In addition, many of the more valuable items donated for these sales failed to bring anything close to what they were worth in the garage sale setting. Similar items tend to do much better when auctioned to the highest bidder on a worldwide web site

like eBay. Funds raised from just a few of the "high end" donations PFOA receives could exceed the amount raised from hundreds of standard garage sale items.

People wanting to donate items for potential listings on eBay should call ahead to be sure that their donations are within the realm of what PFOA can sell and ship. We hope to be able to list items whose ultimate sale price will be \$50 or more, and to avoid items too large to be conveniently packaged and shipped by one person. Additionally, until we have become experienced shippers we would

like to avoid highly breakable glass items.

Auction items of special interest would be such things as early century World's Fair collectibles, Civil War and WWI items, well made metal toys from the 1920s—1960s, celebrity autographed items, rare JFK memorabilia, Beatles dolls from the '60s in the original boxes, etc.

Free and Easy Ways to Help PFOA

Many people who want to help PFOA would like to do so without contributing large amounts of money or time. Two ways to do this are: 1) Do your online shopping by logging on first to iGive.com; and 2) save your empty computer printer cartridges and donate them to PFOA instead of tossing them.

iGive.com represents a unique opportunity for people to donate to PFOA indirectly and without spending an extra penny. The way it works is that the iGive site acts as sort of an online "mall" for hundreds of retailers, many of whom you already know or from

whom you already buy...names like Barnes and Noble, JC Penney, Eddie Bauer, Old Navy, K-Mart, QVC, PetsMart, Petco, Nutrisystem, GNC, Walter Drake, CompUSA, Spiegel, Neiman Marcus, Thrifty Car Rental, Priceline.com, Drugstore.com, Made in Washington, Hickory Farms, Harry and David, Figi's, Swiss Colony and almost 500 others!

Each time you make a purchase from one of these retailers (when accessed via iGive.com), a percentage of your purchase price is donated to the charity of your choice. If that's PFOA, we receive

from 1-26%, depending on the retailer. And you haven't spent anything more to purchase the product than you would have otherwise.

A company called cashforcritters pays PFOA to collect empty printer cartridges which they then refill and resell at a discount. If you're throwing your empty cartridges away, please start saving them for us. We get paid \$1-4 each for them and it all adds up!

Cartridges can be brought to membership meetings, given to a PFOA board member or sent to our post office box. No Epsons, please!



VET-SMARTZ by Riverside Veterinary Services, Ashburton, New Zealand

Editors note: We thought it would be fun to hear from a veterinarian in another country on some particular problem that effects pets no matter where they are in the world. Ashburton, New Zealand's Riverside Veterinary Services provided this article on the issue of cat sunburn.

As sunlight intensifies during the summer, remember that animals can be affected by sunburn as well. This is especially true for white cats and dogs.

In dogs and cats, the sunburn usually affects the ears and nose. The symptoms are largely the same as in people—redness, blistering, etc. Also as in people, chronic sun exposure can produce cancerous changes in the skin. In cats, at least, which seem to be most commonly affected, chronic sunburn will become cancerous. The result is that vets often have to amputate the tips of white cats' ears, and also put to sleep cats in which the lesions are advanced.

So during the summer let's think about our animal friends when we put on shirts, hats and sun block. Sun block (Filta-bac cream) is available from vet clinics and "shirts" can be made for some animals that will tolerate them. Above all, shelter and shade has to be provided.

Tattooing cats' ears seems to help in some cases and is an option you may wish to discuss with your vet.

PFOA Sets Up Emergency Medical Fund

What happens to a suffering cat or dog whose low-income human guardian cannot afford to go to a veterinarian for help? Much too often the pet lingers in pain or sickness, a simple injury turns into a major one or the pet even dies needlessly.

That's why PFOA is establishing an Emergency Medical Fund to help such pets and people in distress. From the jobless person who finds an unknown and

critically injured dog in his yard to the single mom with four kids whose cat has developed a lifethreatening blockage in his urinary track, PFOA gets several calls weekly from people who desperately need help for suffering animals whose conditions are serious and urgent.

PFOA's Emergency Medical Fund is intended to help people and pets in just these kinds of circumstances. You can be part of the solution by penciling in a category—"Emergency Medical Fund"—not yet printed on the donation envelope inserted into this newsletter. Then the next time you send a contribution to PFOA, put a check mark next to that category and your donation will be applied toward helping animals with these kinds of serious medical needs.

People and pets alike will be immensely grateful.

ALL ABOUT SPONSORING AN ADOPTION-CHALLENGED PET

A certain percentage of the pets who have come to be cared for by PFOA are generally thought to be unadoptable or "adoption challenged." Of course, there are a few extra special people out there who might potentially adopt a longtime Safe Haven resident with special needs. But most of these pets will continue to be in PFOA care for many months or years, or even for their entire lives.

Anyone can sponsor one of PFOA's adoption-challenged pets for as little as \$10 a month. Yearly sponsorships are \$120, and lifetime sponsorships are \$500. Just fill out the form on the donation envelope that came with this newsletter and send it back with your payment. In return you'll receive pictures of your sponsored pet and a biographical history.


VOLUNTEER: Judith Hatch

Still not convinced that spay/neuter reduces euthanasia?

Santa Barbara in 1975. Within 10 years, the number of animals euthanized at the city shelter fell by 80%.

The San Francisco SPCA began a subsidized spay/neuter program in 1975. By 1991, the organization had stopped euthanizing all adoptable dogs and cats.

Since 1992, King County's spay/neuter legislation has reduced the number of animals euthanized by 52%.

A subsidized spay/neuter clinic was opened in The Minnesota legislature found that for every \$1 invested in municipally operated spay/neuter clinics, taxpayers would save \$18.72 in future animal control costs over a 10-year period. Similar findings: The Denver Conference on Dog and Cat Control.

> Spay USA says an unspayed female cat, her mate and all their offspring, producing two litters per year with 2.8 surviving kittens per litter can total 11,606,077 cats in only 9 years; dogs, 67,000 in 6 years.

Basic Rules For Cats Who Have a House to Run

DOORS: Do not allow closed doors in any room. To get a door opened, stand on hind legs and bammer with forepaws. Once door is opened, it is not necessary to use it. After you have ordered an outside door opened, stand halfway in and halfway out and think about several things. This is particularly important during very cold weather, rain, snow and mosquito season.

WORK: If one of your humans is sewing or writing and another is idle, stay with the busy one. This is called helping, otherwise known as hampering. Following are two rules for hampering: 1) When supervising cooking, sit just behind the left heel of the cook. You cannot be seen and therefore stand a better chance of being stepped on, picked up and consoled; 2) For book readers, get in close under the chin between the human's eye and the book—unless you can lie across the book itself.

HAIRBALLS AND RUGS: If you have to throw up, get to a chair quickly. If you cannot manage in time, get to an Oriental rug. In no Oriental rug, shag is good.

GUESTS: 1) When walking among dishes on the dinner table, be prepared to look surprised and hurt when scolded. The idea is to convey, "But you allow me on the table when company isn't here." 2) For sitting on laps or rubbing against trousers, select fabric color which contrasts well with your fur. For example, white-furred cats should go for black wool clothing. 3) Quickly determine which guest dislikes cats the most. Sit on that human's lap. If you can arrange to have Friskies Fish Glop on your breath, so much the better. 4) Always accompany guests to the bathroom. It isn't necessary to do anything. Just sit and stare.
