## Good Samaritans help Ivy and kittens

A few hours later the Good Samaritan who lived there saw Ivy emerge, dragging a kitten by its umbilical cord. The woman was able to pick Ivy up when the cat stopped and severed the cord. Then she found the other four kittens as well, and called a neighbor, who made a place for them in her garage for the night. Ivy knew she was safe and settled down with her kittens to see what morning would bring. Sadly, one kitten, the last, did not live to see the dawn.

The Samaritan called PFOA the next day and found that we could take them in. So she took the little family to be checked over by Dr. Sharon Jensen at Blue Mountain Animal Clinic, where our most active foster mom, Penni Allen, met and took the cat and kittens home with her.

Safety at last! Kind hands and voices, delicious, nourishing food, clean water, and a soft bed. Ivy was so happy that she and her kittens were safe – she purred and purred.

But then the next day, PFOA got another call – this one from the Port Angeles Police Department asking if we could take a tiny kitten whose eyes weren't open yet, who'd been found on a sidewalk by yet another


Good Samaritan.

A quick call to Penni, "Yes," and little Solo, a black Persian-type kitten, joined Penni and Ivy. Ivy cleaned him up and he soon had a full tummy and a place in the family.

A couple of days passed and then a *third* Good Samaritan (actually an older couple) contacted us. They'd found a three-week-old Siamese-mix kitten and needed help. "Penni?" "Sure." And Tinker Bell also went to the Allen's house.

Since Tinker Bell was so much bigger than Ivy's kittens, Penni bottle fed her separately at first. But soon it was apparent that Tinker Bell needed a mom's attention. So Ivy took her in hand as well, and taught her the things a kitten needs to know.


### Meet 2 volunteers: Dave and Francie Louden

ave and Francie Louden help Peninsula Friends of Animals in a very big way — transporting animals to veterinarian offices. The need is neverending — spaying and neutering, emergency care, and sick calls bound for Sequim and Port Hadlock, several times each month and as often as once a week.

When an e-mail request comes in from Safe Haven, the Loudens carve out time for the trips. The two-hour, 85-mile round trip to Port Hadlock means an early morning departure with several cages of cats, and sometimes kittens. Dave and Francie will make a day out of it, dropping off animals in the morning for vet care, then poking around shops and restaurants for a few hours, and picking the animals up in the afternoon for the ride back to Safe Haven. The Loudens contribute both their time and gasoline.

"It beats working," Francie says, referring to their previous lives in Renton employed by the Highline School District. Francie was library acquisition secretary for 7 years and executive secretary

to director of budget and accounting for 18 years; Dave was media production manager for 18 years and head technician of the performing arts center for 12 years.

The couple began building their Port Angeles home themselves in 1994, but moved into it permanently upon retirement three years ago. Not long after, they toured Safe Haven, prompting them to get involved because, Francie says, "We were impressed. Everyone was so dedicated. Safe Haven was being run like a well-oiled machine."

Sadly, the Loudens recently lost their beloved tiny poodle, Emily, to heart failure, adopted from PFOA as a rescue dog a year and a half ago. A neighbor's barn cat and PFOA rescue, Buttercup, adopted *them* last fall.

In addition to transporting cats and donated pet food in their restored 1957 Volkswagen bus, Dave and Francie help fold thousands of *Pet Tidings* newsletters for mailing every quarter. Francie also writes thank-you notes for donations and membership dues that come to PFOA. Since January 2007, she has written 936 notes.

"Volunteering for PFOA is a wonderful way to give back to the community," she says.

# Speedy's legacy


(Please note: This story does not have a happy ending but the editors of Pet Tidings felt it needed to be told as it is indicative of the great caring exhibited by generous veterinarians on our Peninsula.)

"Speedy" first entered my life on Feb. 28, 2007. This cat had been found in a culvert in the West End by a Good Samaritan. He was cared for overnight in Forks and brought to our clinic in Port Hadlock the next morning.

Speedy was a medical mess. He had probably been hit by a car. He had fractures in several places in his face and jaw. His left eye was very swollen and bruised.

He was a very strong cat — he had to be to have survived the culvert, the night in Forks, and the ride to the next county to come to us. We decided that if he could survive all that, we could not give up on him. So began the three weeks of trying to save Speedy. The whole clinic staff felt the tug on our heartstrings by this wonderful and probably homeless cat. We treated him for his shock and edema with steroids, antibiotics, intravenous fluids — and TLC.

At first Speedy didn't react well to our handling, and I thought he might be a feral cat — another complication he didn't need in his life. Then Speedy started to respond favorably to our attention. After four days of medical treatment, we felt it was safe to operate. We anesthetized him, neutered him, repaired the open hard palate fracture in the roof of his mouth,



and the fractured mandible/jawbone. We treated his damaged left eye and slowly, the eye started to open and the bruising faded. We tried to place a feeding tube into his throat to help get nutrition into him, but there was too much swelling. That meant that his treatments and nutritional needs had to be met with injectable medications.

Speedy responded well to the medical and surgical treatments as well as to the loving attention we gave him. He purred and loved to be petted. He started to regain some of his lost weight. He started to eat, which was a wonderful day for all of us. He was beginning to act like a regular cat, and the whole clinic staff was hopeful that all his injuries would heal and we would get to see him be healthy and whole.

Then, 17 days after he was admitted, Speedy had his first seizure. We treated him with steroids, fluids, and anti-seizure medicine. The seizure stopped, but he was lethargic and depressed the rest of the day. "Just a drug reaction," we all thought after he had no seizure the following day. Then he had more seizures, which really wiped him out. We continued to treat him and hoped that he would hurdle one more problem just as he

had all the others.

But Speedy's seizures became more frequent and prolonged, and the medicine did nothing to control them. As the seizures worsened, I had to face the fact that they were probably caused by the trauma to his head and that he wasn't going to get better.

On the fourth day of intermittent seizures and with Speedy getting worse, I knew that the last gift we could give him was to let him go. With tears in our eyes, my technician and I held Speedy one last time, and gave him the gift of a merciful death. Even now, months later as I write this, I have tears in my eyes thinking about this marvelous cat that entered our lives the last day of February. He only stayed three weeks, but his memory will last a lifetime.

So many people were touched by this special cat — the rescuer who found him and then drove two hours to bring him to the clinic; the second rescuer who cared for him through that long first night; the PFOA staff and volunteers who called and worried about him even though they'd never met this tabby cat; and finally my staff and I who see many injured and sick animals, but will remember this special cat for a long time.

Bless you, Speedy. Thank you for spending some time with us and have fun at the Rainbow Bridge!

# A safety tip for active pets

In a playful mood, does your pet sometimes go rushing headlong under the bed, only to come up short when it runs head-on into one of those metal leg supports holding the springs up in place? This is especially likely if you have a bed skirt or long bedspread to the floor, concealing those leg supports. This can lead to a nasty blow to the cranium, causing a tear, concussion, tumor, swelling, even brain damage. It might not even be noticed until much later, since pets are good at hid-

ing their injuries — in the animal kingdom, it is a sign of weakness.

You can protect your pet by padding the bed legs. Visit any hardware or plumbing store where they sell foam rubber tubing in lengths up to 10 feet and with various diameters. The tubing comes slit length-wise, made for easy popping onto hot water pipes and such.

The tube from a toilet roll or paper towel can be a good measuring tool. Measure the metal legs under the bed and cut off a piece of the cardboard tubing to fit. If the foam tubing comes in colors (usually black or gray), lighter is better, as the pet can see it sooner and dodge. If it hits the metal leg, damage to the pet will be minimal with padding in place.

Secure the tubing with duct tape, which should be pulled only tight enough to close the slit. In fact, when you are finished, you should be able to rotate the tubing by hand.

This foam tubing can be used in other places indoors or out, such as guy wires on poles. It can even be cut to fit and taped onto injury-prone corners, ledges or shelves.

What is the first, foremost, and most eternally challenging chore of Peninsula Friends of Animals – and every other charitable organization?

Every penny comes from people, near and far, who believe in us and the work we do – who love animals as we do. It may seem as though all we do is ask for money from our members and supporters. We *do* appeal to those who support our work, but that is only one avenue we go down.

Our volunteers have written numerous grants since our founding, nearly all of which have been successful, and which have brought in several thousand dollars to support specific programs, such as spay/neuter.

Several years ago we produced and sold our first nude calendar, and have followed it with two more.





These girls must be placed together and with their adorable personalities, they're sure to make some lucky person or family very happy for years to come.









Blueberry and Salmonberry




Suzy and Nelix



#### Hi everyone,


