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From the Editor's Desk

Although Peninsula Friends of Animals was formally started about 13 years ago, a more significant anniversary was reached this year.

We moved into our headquarters and animal shelter, Safe Haven, in late 2003/early 2004 (there was a time period when we were "in," but not really – and then we were really "in" but not completely!). So we are celebrating that beginning, and our progress since then, throughout 2013/2014.

We have lots to celebrate, due to the generosity and hard work of our members, our donors, our volunteers, our staff and our Board of Directors.

We have spayed or neutered 4,595 pets belonging to low-income community members, and have also spayed or neutered every unneutered cat or dog that we have rescued and rehomed.

We have found good, loving homes for 1,869 pets and cared for those few who came to us and could not be rehomed – usually at Safe Haven, and now at Barker House – or "permanent" foster homes, as well. Our beautiful spacious, cageless indoor/outdoor quarters and kind "pet socializers" provide a safe and loving home for however long it takes to find a forever home for all our rescues.


We have been blessed with several larger gifts and bequests that have allowed us to acquire a caretaker's cottage, Barker House, several small outbuildings for special purposes and to maintain and upgrade our physical plant. A special gift from a very special person paid off our mortgage, and Safe Haven and PFOA are debt-free.


Spay/neuter outreach and shelter/adoption services have been our core mission since our founding. However, we are now planning and working toward also offering lifetime care for cats whose guardians can no longer care for them because of disability or death. What we can do, and how soon, will depend on our resources in this uncertain economic climate.

But as we look back at the progress and successes of the past 10 years, we feel hopeful and reasonably confident about the next ten. We will need the continued support of all of you who have helped make PFOA and Safe Haven a beacon of hope for the animals who need us.

And yet, the thought of those blue eyes in that tiny cage, waiting to die, having given up . . .

We took him home, renamed him Shadow (he just wasn't an Abner) and tried to help him adjust. But whatever the memories that tortured him, he couldn't be comforted. At night he paced back and forth in the bedroom, meowing constantly. Worse, he sprayed numerous places in the house. Predictably, Cricket, our alpha calico female, stayed in his face constantly, letting him know he was an intruder, which only stressed him further.

I couldn't bear to offer him a home and then withdraw the offer, but after five nights of no sleep, we had to acknowledge it wasn't working. We called PFOA and they told us that if he kept spraying in the house, he would become unadoptable. Literally in tears, we began to load his things in the car to take him back. However, when he saw what we were doing, he ran back into the house — the first sign that he wanted to be there.

I called PFOA back to tell them he was staying, then I told Shadow he could live with us and be loved forever, if he chose. I also promised him there would never be another cage in his life.

That night, for the first time, he crawled up in my lap and purred.

After that, progress was rapid. He acknowledged Cricket as Queen of the Known Universe, and they became buddies.

(Now, he even tries to bully her, until she has enough and smacks him silly.) He got bigger and much stronger. We still don't know anything of his history, although we met a veterinarian who thought she remembered him being brought in after a house fire. We think someone may have tried to drown him once, as we discovered he is absolutely petrified of water. The first time we tried to give him a bath by holding him under a warm faucet, he panicked and did his considerable best to rip open my shoulder with his front claws, while simultaneously disemboweling me with his hind feet. (Unfortunately, anticipating getting wet, I wasn't wearing a shirt at the time.)

No laser guidance system has ever been more accurate than Shadow jumping up onto the bed at night to land unerringly on my bladder. Then he burrows under the covers to snuggle between us until he gets too warm, at which point he emerges to sleep half on, half off my legs, stretching the covers down over them. (When Cricket reciprocates on the other side, the effect is like being shrink-wrapped.)

We are thankful to have him in our life and as his Chief of Staff, I have tried to make his life as happy as I can. Whether he has managed to exorcise his demons, or has merely locked them securely away, I can't say. But he seems happy and contented and at peace. We never forget, though, that it was PFOA that saved his life, and every day we are grateful for their work.

This year's Annual Meeting was held on May 22 at the Lazy Acres Clubhouse. A social hour featuring a "Snackluck" preceded the business meeting. The meeting was very well attended, with a lively discussion on proposed changes to the bylaws. The proposed changes were rejected by the membership; special committees were later formed to propose solutions to issues raised during the meeting. Four directors appointed by the Board were confirmed by the membership.

The Board welcomes what appeared to be an increased interest of some of the membership to become more active and involved in decisions that need to be made regarding the future of PFOA.



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All about TNR: Trap, Neuter and Return

After watching the Europeans do it successfully for many years, numerous groups across the U.S. have finally adopted a program to trap feral cats humanely, neuter them, and then return them to their colonies. PFOA has such a program, and your donations help support our efforts!

Why take the time and effort? Well, think about the following facts for just a moment:

Spaying just one female can help prevent the birth of 400,000 unwanted offspring over the next seven years. It's true. It's also true that our efforts are reducing the size of feral cat colonies and improving the lives of the kitties out there.

Spaying and neutering cats also result in healthy weight gain after they are returned to their colonies – a fact proven by research done at the University of Florida.

Research done in London shows that **feral cats who** are neutered or spayed become more affectionate towards each other and fight less.

When we trap our cats, we take the time and invest the money to also treat any health problems. This program additionally gives us a chance to identify those cats who were simply dumped by their owners out into the wild to fend for themselves. These kitties speak up by being more social and loving and raising their paw to tell us, "Please find me a home!" Think about how hard it must be for a kitty to go from a warm, dry home, to fending for herself outside – no food, no shelter. As much as these cats adapt and learn to survive, they also just want to find another good, clean, dry home. PFOA's program helps make that wish come true.

But we can't do it alone – of course we can't. Even though we have volunteers who spend hours of time answering the phone, chasing down leads, helping to trap, transport and care for these cats, we still need help from our supporters. Just think about it: one small donation from you or your friends could help prevent the suffering of 400,000 cats. Pretty amazing, huh? You – yes, you! – have the power to change the world.

Fostering 101

Every situation is different. There could be an only kitten, a few kittens. lots of kittens, a friendly mom with kittens, a not so friendly mom with kittens or a pregnant mom. They all have different needs. You need to be flexible with your time commitment. As hard as we try, things don't always work out the way we want them to. The plan may be for you to have a few kittens for a week or two, but that could turn into much longer. There might not be room for them at the shelter or they could have a medical problem that would need to be cleared up first. In the case of a pregnant or nursing mom you could have them for 2-3 months. (Trust me: the longer you have them, the harder it will be to give them up!)

Pregnant and nursing moms are pretty easy to take care of and don't

need a lot from you until the kittens are older and start to eat on their own and use the litter box. Then the kittens can be pretty messy and take up a lot of your time feeding and cleaning up after them. At first they tend to get most of the food all over them instead of in them! They will spill their water and walk in it. They are really good at getting litter everywhere, but since they are so cute you won't mind.

Anyone with lots of love and time to offer would make a good foster mom. Teenagers who are out of school for the summer make excellent foster moms for kittens, especially single kittens.



A nursing or pregnant mom would need a separate, quiet place where she would not be disturbed, away from other household pets and children. Older kittens will do fine in any small place and will need to be around people and normal household noises so that they are properly socialized. An only kitten especially needs to have a lot of attention because it is all alone.

It is a lot of fun to watch the kittens grow up. They will keep you laughing with their funny antics. It is hard to be in a bad mood when you are around little kittens. You can get your "kitten fix" if for some reason you cannot have a kitten of your own. It is very rewarding to raise a litter of kittens and see them go to good homes where they will be loved and cared for. Meet a Volunteer: Ann Gilson

"Did you say nude?" "Yes, nude," Ann replies matter-of-factly. I detect a sparkle of mischief in her eye at catching me off guard. Nude calendars aren't something one normally associates with animal rescue organizations. Ann is a talented fundraiser, and the idea of a nude calendar that featured animals from Safe Haven shelter, along with people, tastefully photographed in various states of nudity, was her brainchild. Although the calendars raised some eyebrows in the community, the sales were phenomenal, providing needed funds for the shelter.

Ann continues her story: "My interest in pets started at about age three. Mother allowed us to keep any animal as long as we took care of it. But pets were short-lived then. A five-year-old cat, for instance, was an old cat. There were no veterinarians who treated cats and dogs, no flea medication, no cat litter or special pet food." It was out of these early experiences and observations that Ann's compassion for animals was born, inspiring her to volunteer in animal rescue – her passion for over 50 years. "It's the most important thing in

my life. I've adopted over a hundred cats since I first joined the Humane Society," she estimates. Today she cares for seventeen cats, mostly elderly, injured, or with various behavior problems. In her eyes, "All cats are beautiful, if only in spirit."

When Ann moved to Washington in 1989, she had no thought of starting an animal shelter. Recently retired from her position as a librarian and the presidency of her local Humane Society in River Falls, Wisconsin, she planned only to care for animals in her new home – which she designed herself "for cats, dogs, and people." Yet approximately ten years later, she became one of the founding members of PFOA and today remains a sustaining and guiding force behind the organization.

Now in her eighty-seventh year, Ann is an active board member, helps plan monthly meetings, has applied for grants, written press releases, given PR talks to various organizations, and since the beginning of Pet Tidings as a one-page flier in 2003, has given generously of her considerable talents as a writer and editor. Although this tenth anniversary issue will be her last as editor, she will still contribute

the occasional story. Today she looks forward to a new adventure: recruitment and training of volunteers for PFOA. Of her many years as a volunteer Ann says, "I've enjoyed every minute of it. I love spending time with the cats, and I've made many friends whom I might not have met otherwise."

I turn again to the calendars. "I'm in there, too," Ann tells me. "I'm Miss September, 2004." And there she is, reclining in her lounge chair, wearing only a pair of boots, but demurely draped by two of her gorgeous longhaired cats. Now that's a volunteer!

Ask PFOA: On Grieving

Many of us find an unusual connection with an animal whom we've adopted; we find an animal that is not just a cat or just a dog, but instead we find a soul with whom we connect on a deeper level, sometimes feeling closer to these animals than we do to our own friends or loved ones. Oftentimes, the loss of a pet leaves a hole in our heart that's deeper than we'd anticipated, and we need to reach out for help during the grieving process.

Since there are so few of us out there who truly understand our grief, finding someone to talk to can be difficult. To a lot of people, these are just animals and we should just get over it. Or just go get another one and get over it. Even when we are among like-minded souls and friends who truly understand, there may be times where we need something more to help us through the grieving process: we need a support

As I prepared to write this article, I searched locally for a support group, and couldn't find one. Someone suggested our local senior center, but the lovely woman there, Tish, said she wishes we had a local support group – she, too, could use one.

Although not exactly local, our very own Washington State University runs a Pet Loss Hotline (1.509.335.5704) to help people through various stages of the grieving process. It is staffed by volunteer veterinary students and is part of an elective class on pet loss. They are even available to help us talk through our guilt over deciding whether or not to choose euthanasia for our pet, and have resources for talking to our children about the decision and the process.

I had the opportunity to chat with Ashley, one of the veterinary students who volunteers on the hotline. "It's important to let people know that everyone grieves in their own way and that how they feel is normal," she explained one evening. "Some people experience physical symptoms and that's normal, too. There's also no time limit on how long each person grieves. Sometimes people ask how long it will take and we just tell them each person is different."

Let's not forget that our other pets also grieve.

Remember that they experience loss when they lose a caregiver, a fellow pet or housemate, or when a caregiver's medical condition changes – our pets even grieve when their best friend goes off to college. Their behavior may change as they have very few options for communicating their grief to us. Be understanding and patient with them if they withdraw, or if their eating, sleeping, or toileting habits change. We should work to communicate with them and spend extra time with them. While it's easy enough to turn to our pets

for comfort during these times, this is a time when they also need our comfort. They will need to adjust to new schedules and new patterns the same as we will, and if we keep patience and compassion in our hearts they will repay our efforts tenfold.

> What about just getting to the decision to put our pet to sleep? We've all been there and we know it can be painful. It's important to remember that there is no right or wrong in this decision. Some people choose to put their pet to sleep sooner rather than later; others choose to keep their pet as comfortable as possible with various tools available to us, including acupuncture. If we are acting out of love and compassion, and if we open our hearts and listen to our pets, they will tell us when it's time for them to go.

At the end of my conversation with Ashley, I asked for some parting words of wisdom. She said, "In talking with the people who call in, it's obvious from their grief that they loved their pet deeply. I've never talked with anyone who made the wrong decision."

All the other pets here have adjusted just fine with no problems.

I started letting the kittens have full range of the house just a few days ago. When things are quiet enough, Henry comes out to play, and I've been very careful about letting the dogs interact with him. They are curious but very gentle with him. I think we had a major breakthrough a couple of days ago: I was brushing Henry on my lap, and Joey approached. Henry didn't seem fearful of him, and the two sniffed noses. Joey got on the couch beside us, and I continued to brush Henry and tell him how brave he was being. As we sat there, Henry carefully reached out his paw and started to play with the dog's tail! SO CUTE! If I can convince Henry the dogs are indeed made of string, I think things will be ok.

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The PFOA Spay/Neuter Program

Three small kittens are scrounging around in garbage, mewing pitifully. Nearby their thin, bedraggled mother nervously keeps watch, as she roots around for something to eat. They have a tenuous and miserable existence. fraught with peril.

This wouldn't have happened, had someone been responsible and/or able to afford to spay their mother or neuter their father.

To avoid tragedies such as this, Peninsula Friends of Animals' spay/neuter program was started in 2003 with a

generous grant from Petco. Preventing the birth of unwanted kittens is a lot easier and more costeffective than trying to rescue and re-home them.

One of PFOA's two main purposes for existing is to prevent the birth of kittens for whom there is no home on earth. The second is to rescue those

who have already been born, and place them in loving homes. Reliable estimates conclude that there are homes for only one out of every ten cats born. Our mission is to see that the other nine don't die helpless and alone.

Spaying or neutering your pet is not only the right thing to do when it comes to helping with the pet overpopulation problem -- it is kinder to your dog or cat as well. Your pets are less likely to have behavioral problems when they have been spayed or neutered. They are less apt to want to roam neighborhoods and get into fights with other animals. And finally, giving birth and mothering six or eight offspring takes a lot out of your pet!

Cost is the primary reason that most people do not spay or neuter their animals. Fifty percent of the population of Clallam County qualifies for assistance with their spay/

neuter costs. Students, retirees, single parents, as well as impoverished people are among our clients. We have found that most people truly love their animals, and are grateful to have this assistance.

Information on our spay/neuter program may be found on our website, on our Facebook page, and on flyers displayed in the Sequim-Port Angeles area. Qualifying low-income families for this service is a simple process, consisting of a telephone interview with Sharon Palmer,

> PFOA Spay/Neuter Manager, and a follow up form.

February is National Spay/Neuter month. During each February, we have informational tables at local businesses where income-qualified people can sign up for a chance to receive free

spay/neuter services. A drawing is held, and a number of free spays or neuters are awarded. Sharon has been active in the program since shortly after its inception, and states that when the recipients are notified, "just to hear the excitement in their voices makes my day."

When funds are available, PFOA has sponsored additional low-cost events. Last December, there was a "nickel neuter" program allowing 75 male cats to be neutered for five cents each! In January, PFOA had a spay clinic charging only \$5.00 per female cat.

PFOA partners with several local veterinarians, as well as with Spay To Save, the only mobile spay/neuter clinic on the peninsula. Spaying or neutering your cat or dog is affordable and accessible. These services exist. Help us end the suffering of unwanted animals. •


